Statement of intent

We want disadvantaged pupils to make progress that is at least in line with non-disadvantaged pupils and provide a curriculum rich in experience with high aspirations for all. We aim to remove barriers to learning created by disadvantage and improve children's ability to communicate effectively in a wide range of contexts. Link between SEND, PPG and attendance

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

1	38% of pupil premium children are on our SEND register. 55% of these children have a communication or SLC need
2	Attendance of children eligible for pupil premium is below expectations - 91%
3	Boys make up a disproportionate amount of children eligible for pupil premium
4	40% of children eligible for pupil premium are summer born
5	Not all children who qualify for additional funding are registered and therefore keeping track of children who eligible for pupil premium is a challenge
6	Aspirations for some children eligible for pupil premium are too low
